DOCUMENTING YOUR STORY

• Every single one of you has a story, and your story is worth documenting and sharing. It is worth remembering.

If you don't yet have a FamilySearch account, see "Create an account" in the upper right corner of the FamilySearch home page. In FamilySearch Memories, you can document your story with photos, documents, and stories. Once you have the living people filled in on your part of the tree (starting with you), that's when exciting things can happen! So fill in what you can and then get some help filling in the first four generations - up to your great-grandparents and watch what happens! If anyone else has entered information about common ancestors - that information will appear on your tree!

On your phone, you can download the apps "Family Tree" and "Memories," so you can add memories, do research, find temple names for proxy ordinance work, receive family information, and do all kinds of additional activities. See Memories and Family Tree mobile app features FamilySearch.

So many of you know about documenting memories because you do it all the time - it's
called social media. For those who participate - You are already record keepers - you are already
doing family history by writing yours - one post or message at a time!
And when you save your photos and social media screenshots to FamilySearch, they are saved
forever!

With the FamilySearch Memories Audio app or the Record My Story feature on FamilySearch Discovery, gathering, digitally recording, sharing, and preserving has never been easier. Read more in The Family History Guide here.So grab your cell - go to the Memories app, and hit that plus button to add an audio message, a story, or a photo. That's family history on the go!

BACK TO YOUR FUTURE

- Who knows what will mean the most to your posterity years down the road. What will they want to know about your story and what things were like for you when you were young? How will your stories inspire and bless them?
 - "Your story should be written now while it is fresh and while the true details are available...the way you face up to challenges that beset you. Do not suppose life changes so much that your experiences will not be interesting to your posterity. Experiences of work, relations with people, and an awareness of the rightness and wrongness of actions will always be relevant. Your journal, like most others, will tell of problems as old as the world and how you dealt with them." Spencer W. Kimball Speaks Out on Personal Journals
- What do you think about writing a message to your future spouse? What would it be like for a husband to read a message from the girl he married a letter that she wrote to him before they ever met? What would it be like for a wife to read a note written by her husband to her when he was a teen?

Knowing about what your ancestors wanted you to know about them will help you know what
might be important to those who come after you! Record what you want your posterity (future
family) to know about you.

THEIR STORY IS YOUR BACKSTORY

- What did your ancestors want you to know about them? The story of your ancestors is your "backstory" and is part of your story. Their lives can bless you in amazing ways. Explore their journals, stories, to see what meant the most to them. It might take a bit of detective work but you've got this!

- A great place to start learning more about your story is to start with your living relatives. Interview
 them to see what they remember about your common ancestors, and what they want you to know
 about their own story. Record your interviews both formal and informal.



Why We Need Our Family Story Now More Than Ever

- "In an article in the New York Times entitled, <u>The Stories That Bind Us</u>, Bruce Feiler reported on research into children's resiliency and their ability to deal with stress. Children who knew a lot about their families:
 - Tended to do better than other children when they faced challenges.
 - Proved to be more resilient and able to moderate the effects of stress.
 - Had a stronger sense of control over their lives.
 - Had higher self-esteem.
 - Believed that their family functioned successfully.
 - Felt that they belonged to something larger than themselves.

From family stories, children gain insights into how to deal with the situations they encounter in life. A family's stories tend to support a "unifying narrative" or pattern. For example, family narratives might include: overcoming adversity, doing what's right, and helping other people in times of need. The healthiest narratives reinforce the sense that family members persevered through many ups and downs as best they could with varying degrees of success.

- Tell stories to children whenever possible (at the dinner table, in the car, and so on). Tell
 all types of stories, from simple or humorous (our family's worst vacation ever) to
 profound (my grandmother's struggle with cancer).
- Tells stories that reflect life's ups and downs but result in a positive outcome over time and show the family's ability to overcome difficulties. Read more here and here.
- "Connecting with our ancestors can change our lives in surprising ways. From their trials and accomplishments, we gain faith and strength.¹⁶ From their love and sacrifices, we learn to forgive and move forward. Our children become resilient. We gain protection and power. - Sample story from <u>John Bytheway</u>

Two days before his eighteenth birthday, Jack Bytheway joined the United States Navy along with three friends from South High School in Salt Lake City, Utah. A little over a year later, Jack was at his battle station on an aircraft carrier northwest of Iwo Jima under attack by Kamikazes. He stayed at his post on an anti-aircraft gun and fought for his life, and the lives of his shipmates. Three of Jack's shipmates also had Jack's eternal life in mind. Jack was not a member of the church at the time, but his three friends were. When the announcement came for "Mormon

Church Services" in the library of the ship, Jack's friends went to work, pulling him off his bunk and taking him to church. Jack said he didn't understand most of what was going on, but it planted a seed. After the war, Jack decided to date some Latter-day Saint girls. The rest is history – or better said – family history







HELPING OTHERS WITH TEMPLE WORK AND FAMILY HISTORY

• "Many of you may think family history work is to be performed primarily by older people. But I know of no age limit described in the scriptures or guidelines announced by Church leaders restricting this important service to mature adults. You are sons and daughters of God, children of the covenant, and builders of the kingdom. You need not wait until you reach an arbitrary age to fulfill your responsibility to assist in the work of salvation for the human family. The Lord has made available in our day remarkable resources that enable you to learn about and love this work that is sparked by the Spirit of Elijah. For example, FamilySearch is a collection of records, resources, and services easily accessible with personal computers and a variety of handheld devices, designed to help people discover and document their family history. These resources also are available in the family history centers located in many of our Church buildings throughout the world.

"It is no coincidence that FamilySearch and other tools have come forth at a time when young people are so familiar with a wide range of information and communication technologies. Your fingers have been trained to text and tweet to accelerate and advance the work of the Lord—not just to communicate quickly with your friends. The skills and aptitude evident among many young people today are a preparation to contribute to the work of salvation.

I invite the young people of the Church to learn about and experience the Spirit of Elijah. I encourage you to study, to search out your ancestors, and to prepare yourselves to perform proxy baptisms in the house of the Lord for *your* kindred dead (see D&C 124:28–36). And I urge you to help other people identify their family histories.

As you respond in faith to this invitation, your hearts shall turn to the fathers. The promises made to Abraham, Isaac, and Jacob will be implanted in your hearts. Your patriarchal blessing, with its declaration of lineage, will link you to these fathers and be more meaningful to you. Your love and gratitude for your ancestors will increase. Your testimony of and conversion to the Savior will become deep and abiding. And I promise you will be protected against the intensifying influence of the adversary. As you participate in and love this holy work, you will be safeguarded in your youth and throughout your lives." David A. Bednar The Hearts of the Children Shall Turn

- A fun idea for wards is to plan activities and events to help older seniors to share and record stories. These can be planned as ward activities, YM and YW combined activities, primary activities, Relief Society or Elders Quorum activities, or special events.
 - The Bluffdale 2nd ward planned a special "1950s" evening to honor the older seniors with a dinner, share their memories on a timeline, and then divide into rooms at the church building to record stories from their lives.





"Fast friendship" is a great way to get to know ward members and their stories. The youth rotate places and ask the Seniors a question about their lives. It works well to schedule an appointment to have a couple of leaders and a few youth to visit and record stories after this activity.
