
Crafting Ancestor Profiles | A Step-by-Step Guide with Storied

Basic Details ☐ **Full Name** – Include maiden name for women if known. ■ Birth Date and Place – Add the city, county, state, and country if available. ■ Marriage(s) – Spouse's name(s), marriage date(s), and place(s). ■ Death Date and Place – If applicable, include burial information. **Family Information** ☐ Parents – Names of mother and father, including maiden names. ☐ **Siblings** – Names of brothers and sisters, birth order if known. Include spouses! ☐ Children – Names, birth, and death dates of their children. Significant Life Events ☐ **Education** – Schools or universities attended, degrees earned. Occupations – Jobs or careers they had during their life. ■ Residences/migrations – List places they lived (cities, states, countries). ■ Military Service - Branch, rank, and service dates, if applicable. Context and Stories Cultural or Ethnic Background – Traditions, language, or heritage tied to their identity. ☐ **Historical Events** – Major historical events they lived through (e.g., wars, Great Depression). ☐ Family Stories - Anecdotes, interesting facts, or legends passed down about them. **Personal Reflections** ☐ Favorite Quotes or Sayings – Known phrases they liked to say. Personality Traits – Descriptions of their character or interests. ■ Hobbies and Skills – Things they enjoyed or excelled at. **Additional Details** Religious Affiliation – Church membership or religious practices. ☐ **Social Organizations** – Clubs, fraternities, or community groups. ☐ Gravestone Details – Inscription and cemetery information if relevant. **Records and Documentation** Census Records – Years they appear in censuses and where they were living. ■ Vital Records – Copies of birth, marriage, and death certificates. Photos – Any images of the ancestor or their family. ■ Newspaper Clippings – Articles, obituaries, or ads related to their life.

Basic Family Details		
☐ Birth Announcements - Look for articles mentioning the birth of family members, which may include		
names, birth dates, and locations.		
☐ Marriage Announcements - Include details about wedding dates, locations, and notable attendees.		
☐ Death Notices and Obituaries - Capture dates, causes of death, burial locations, and biographical		
details often included in obituaries.		
☐ Milestones and Anniversaries - Find celebrations like silver or golden anniversaries that might have		
been covered in the local paper.

☐ School Achievements - Highlight graduations, honor rolls, or sporting achievements.		
☐ Employment and Business News - Include job promotions, new businesses, or retirements.		
☐ Clubs and Organizations - Add mentions of involvement in clubs, churches, or civic organizations.		
☐ Military Service - Look for enlistment notices, promotions, or veterans' stories.		
☐ Travel or Vacations - Newspaper society columns often reported family vacations or notable travels.		
$\ \square$ Holiday Celebrations - Include mentions of family gatherings, community events, or unique traditions		
reported in the newspaper. Look for articles about festive meals, parades, or holiday parties attended by		
your ancestors.		
☐ Party/Event Attendance - Mentions of your ancestors in society columns, including weddings,		
birthdays, anniversaries, or social gatherings.		
☐ Religious Events - Look for announcements of baptisms, confirmations, or other significant religious		
milestones. These records often include names, dates, and locations tied to family faith traditions.		
 Local Politics - Mentions of your ancestors' involvement in local government, such as running for office, 		
voting, or participating in community initiatives.		
Significant Life Events		
☐ Legal Notices - Include wills, estate sales, divorces, or court proceedings involving ancestors.		
☐ Land Transactions - Record property sales or purchases to understand where family members lived.		





☐ Accidents or Crimes - Newspapers may report accidents, arrests, or legal proceedings that involved

family members.

Historical Context

■ Local News - Include events like natural disasters, major celebrations, or historical events that impacte your family's community.	d
Advertisements - Add ads for family businesses or services they used, which provide a glimpse into daily life.	
■ Weather Reports - Note unusual weather events, especially if they coincided with significant family events.	
Census Lists - Occasionally, newspapers published information about local population surveys or voters.	
Cultural & Lifestyle Elements	
 □ Recipes and Hobbies - If family members shared recipes or tips in local papers, include these. □ Letters to the Editor - Look for letters written by family members or referencing them. □ Local Entertainment - Add mentions of movies, shows, or social events attended by family members. 	
Photographs & Images	
 □ Group Photos - Newspapers often printed pictures from events, such as school or community groups. □ Personal Advertisements - Include family members advertising services, sales, or personal messages 	

Helpful Tips

- Always document the source details: newspaper name, date, page number, and column
- Search multiple name variations/spellings
- Check newspapers from all locations family lived (& surrounding cities)
- Look at surrounding articles for context
