



Sentenced Beyond the Seas: Convicts to Australia

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Background

After the American Revolution Britain could no longer send its convicts there. As a result, gaols became overcrowded, and convicts were kept in hulks (decommissioned and often unseaworthy naval vessels). A new solution for dealing with the convicts had to be found. In May 1787, the eleven ships that formed the First Fleet set off from Portsmouth, arriving in Sydney in January 1788.

Convict Career

Convict Locations

- NSW ~80,000 convicts. Convict transportation 1788-1840. A couple of exile ships arrived 1848-1849, but the local population greatly objected and transportation was completely ceased in 1849.
- Norfolk Island. Two periods of settlement 1788-1814 convicts were transferred from Sydney.
 After settlement on Van Diemen's Land had been established, Norfolk Island was considered less suitable, so the convicts were transferred there. In 1825 Norfolk was resettled, this time as a place of secondary punishment. From 1840-1850 ~2740 convicts were transported directly there. The settlement was finally closed in 1853.
- Van Diemen's Land (Tasmania) ~76,000 convicts 1804-1853, which includes those transferred there from NSW and Norfolk Island. Convicts were sent there from NSW from 1804.
 Transportation directly from England 1812-1853. Included two major locations of secondary transportation Sarah Island and Port Arthur.
- Moreton Bay. Settled 1824 as a place of secondary punishment. From 1849-1850 ~660 Exiles arrived. Two ships came directly from the United Kingdom, and about 130 others came from

other Australian colonies. Up until 1842 referred to as the Moreton Bay Penal Settlement of the Colony of New South Wales. From 1842 until separation it is referred to as the Free Settlement of Moreton Bay. In 1859 Queensland separated from NSW and became a separate colony.

- Port Phillip ~1750 Exiles or Pentonvillians sent 1844-1849 on eight ships
- Western Australia. Settled in 1829 as the Swan River Colony with free settlers. In 1832 it was renamed the Colony of Western Australia. From 1850-1868 convicts who had served part of their sentence with good behaviour were sent out as a work force. 9674 men were sent.

Available records

The availability and survival of records varies from colony to colony. New South Wales and Van Diemen's Land (Tasmania) have the best records, despite the fact that many NSW records were destroyed by the government in 1863 and 1870, and some destroyed in 1882 in the Garden Palace fire.

Conditional and Absolute Pardons

There were two main types of pardons available:

- Conditional pardon Convict was free as long as they remained in the colony (within "Government Limits") until original term expired
- **Absolute pardon** sentence was entirely remitted they were free both within and outside of the colony and could return to Britain
- After 1845 two classes of CP
 - o 1st valid everywhere except Europe (for those who would have received AP)
 - o 2nd valid only in the colonies, including NZ
- From 1846 could go to any place except country or colony from which transported
- From 1847 could go anywhere except Great Britain and Ireland
